Returns to Winter Equestrian Festival with a Vision for Sustainable Design

As WEF 11 approaches, Wellington International is thrilled to welcome back Equestrian Gardens, led by owner Jess Jones, for another year of innovative landscape integration on the grass derby field. Partnering once again with esteemed course designer Ken Krome, Equestrian Gardens will enhance the USHJA hunter derby courses with natural and living elements, reinforcing the connection between equestrian sport and sustainable design.

"The USHJA hunter derbies are a source of inspiration for our work. It's in this format and on this platform that we are introducing new practices in sustainable landscape design and bringing plant material into the derby format," says Jones.

The timing of this collaboration couldn't be more fitting as Equestrian Gardens continues its commitment to sustainability through its partnership with Green Is the New Blue. Founded by Stephanie Bulger, Green Is the New Blue is an environmental non-profit that strives to reduce the ecological impacts of equine-

This initiative draws inspiration from Green Is the New Blue's Living Jump, a project dedicated to incorporating sustainable and biodiverse elements into course design.

Equestrian Gardens has already brought this vision to

life, having designed and built the Living Jump, which was showcased at the Hampton Classic under the direction of Scot Evans, Creative Director of Green Is the New Blue. For the project, Jones utilized native plants that were replanted at MeadowView owned by Bulger and her mother, Louise Riggio.

Bulger shares, "The Living Jump was not only a stunning feature, but also a testament to how sustainable design can enhance both the aesthetic and environmental quality of our equestrian spaces."

Equestrian Gardens is a landscape design firm dedicated to crafting dynamic, ecologically

responsible landscapes for equestrian properties. From private farms and ranches to world-class horse show venues, the designs integrate native plants with ecological benefits across the Northeast and Southeast. Their work champions the belief that equestrian spaces should not only serve functionally but also contribute to the health of the surrounding environment.

FUEL YOUR RECOVERY

How to Manage Inflammation for Peak Performance

Equestrian athletes focus intensely on training techniques and their horse's well-being, but personal nutrition sometimes takes a backseat, particularly when it comes to managing inflammation, which is the body's natural response to the physical demands of riding. The good news is that what's on your plate after training and competition can be your most powerful recovery tool.

Temporary inflammation is necessary for muscle repair and growth, but chronic inflammation—caused by overtraining, poor recovery, or inadequate nutrition—can lead to muscle fatigue, joint pain, and sluggish recovery. The right foods can help. A diet rich in antioxidants, fiber, and healthy fats reduces inflammation at the cellular level, supporting quicker healing and sustained performance.

After your ride, prioritize whole, minimally processed foods. Colorful fruits and vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins, and healthy fats should be the foundation

of your recovery meals. Aim for balance with complex carbohydrates like quinoa or sweet potatoes, lean protein from sources like tofu, beans, or fish, and inflammation-fighting foods such as blueberries, leafy greens, turmeric, ginger, and omega-3-rich walnuts, chia seeds, and flax seeds. Tart cherry juice is another great addition, known

for reducing muscle soreness and promoting recovery.

Hydration is just as crucial. Dehydration can contribute to fatigue, muscle cramps, and slower recovery. Aim to drink at least half your body weight in ounces of water daily, and incorporate electrolyte-rich foods like bananas, coconut water, and spinach to maintain muscle

function. And don't overlook sleep. This is when muscle repair happens, making 7 to 9 hours of quality rest essential. Limit screen time before bed, reduce caffeine in the evening, and keep a regular sleep schedule to maximize recovery.

By nourishing your body as well as you care for your horse, you'll stay strong and resilient.

Wellington International played host to a special group of equestrian professionals during week 9 of the Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF). Without this group of dedicated individuals, horse sport would not be possible. The Kappy Kaplan Farrier Appreciation Event, presented by W.F. Young, the makers of Absorbine® products and Back on Track® USA, honored the legacy of Herman ‘Kappy’ Kaplan and the dedication that farriers have to their craft.

The event is a testament to the character, professionalism and heart-felt warmth and gratitude the equestrian

community has towards Kappy, who was a legendary horseman and farrier and made a profound impact on the industry. His years of riding and training horses gave him an uncanny ability to analyze gait faults and develop solutions to enhance a horse’s way of going. He taught shoeing and basic forging skills and became known as “the professor” by all who sought his knowledge.

Kaplan was also a close friend of Gene Mische, founder of WEF. He became the official farrier of Mische’s Stadium Jumping shows, including WEF, and one of the original stakeholders in the

iconic Wellington show series.

Highlighting the evening, the winners of the \$500,000 Bainbridge Companies CSI5* Grand Prix—Emilie Conter and Portobella van de Fruitkorf—were presented with the Herman ‘Kappy’ Kaplan Perpetual Memorial Trophy.

“The genesis of this night is the memory of Kappy Kaplan, who is a special man to all of us whether we knew him or not,” said Lenore Brown, Director of Sponsorship at Wellington International and integral organizer of the Kappy Kaplan Farrier Appreciation Event. “On behalf of everyone at Wellington International, I

want to say how profoundly proud and grateful we are to have the Kappy Kaplan Perpetual Memorial Trophy live with us and be presented during the WEF 9 five-star grand prix. I hope that all of us can live in the way that Kappy did and carry on the memory in this very important profession."

Amy Cairry, W.F. Young Vice President of Marketing,

presented the annual recognition of the evening—the "Friend of the Farrier" Award—to Bryan Quinsey as an individual who has advocated for or served the farrier and hoof care industry.

Quinsey is an Ontario, Canada, native and Former Executive Director at the International Association of Professional Farriers. He also founded the Hoofcare

Essentials Foundation, which promotes the integrity of the farrier industry by supporting educational and charitable needs.

"This is the surprise of a lifetime," said Quinsey after accepting the award. "We started the Hoofcare Essentials Foundation in 2018 to support the farrier industry through continuing education. In 2025, we are prepared to offer grants to farriers for educational opportunities, support for clinics, and sponsorships of national events.

"I am also proud to officially announce a name change to the organization to the Farrier Education Fund," continued Quinsey. "This name spells out exactly what we are all

about; supporting farriers and their education."

Cairry concluded the evening by introducing two new awards: the "Apprentice Achievement Award," presented to aspiring farriers who have dedicated themselves to learning the trade through hard work and passion for craft and horsemanship, as well as the "Kappy Kaplan Farrier Achievement Award," presented to a farrier who boasts a passion for the craft, respect for other professionals and a love for the horse.

These two new awards will be presented for the first time at the at the 2026 Kappy Kaplan Farrier Appreciation Event at Wellington International.

EMILIE CONTER SHATTERS COMPETITION

in Bainbridge Companies CSI5* Grand Prix

In a finish befitting of International Women's Day, Belgium's Emilie Conter stormed to a win in the \$500,000 Bainbridge Companies CSI5* Grand Prix during WEF 9.

In the irons of Portobella van de Fruitkorf, Conter bested a seven-horse jump-off over the Alan Wade (IRL) built course. From a field that included six of the world's top ten ranked riders, the 24-year-old claimed the first five-star victory of her career.

"It hasn't sunk in yet; I'm super happy with my horse and my team for making this happen," said a beaming Conter at the evening's press conference. "I saw a long [distance] to the last oxer and I heard Helena

[Stormanns] scream 'go get it!', so I took it. I didn't think it was going to be enough to beat these other riders, but I looked up and saw that I was in first."

Stopping the clock a second off the winning pace, Olympic team gold medalist Harry Charles (GBR) settled for runner-up aboard Sherlock, a 2013 Belgian Warmblood gelding (Bisquet Balou C x Malito de Reve) owned by Peter Charles & Stall Zet. World no. 1 and reigning FEI World Cup™ Champion Henrik von Eckermann (SWE)

took third on his Olympic partner King Edward, a 15-year-old Belgian Warmblood gelding (Edward 28 x FEO) owned by Dufour Stables AG.

Conter has had the ride on Portobella van de Fruitkorf (Bamako de Muze x Nabab De Reve)—a 10-year-old Belgian Warmblood—since the mare was seven.

"We've come a long way," she said about the mare owned by Stepdex Stables and Paul Swinnen. "We took it very slow in the beginning because I always knew she was special. There are no words for her. When I first started riding her, she was a bit colder always had massive scope. When she was younger, she was not so impressed with the small jumps but now the bigger the fences, the better she jumps."

With several previous connections of Portobella van de Fruitkorf watching along with Conter's visiting grandparents from a sold-out crowd, the victory was made extra sweet for Conter. Capping the night, her groom Lisa Sorg earned the Double H Farm Grooms Award and \$500 prize for her care and preparation of Portobella van de Fruitkorf.

After taking second with Sherlock, Charles noted how the up-and-coming mount impressed in the Wellington

International atmosphere. "It's nearly as good an atmosphere as anywhere in the world," said Charles, who came to Wellington for the first time in 2024 and spent the season there this year. "I didn't plan on jumping Sherlock in too many of the bigger classes under the lights; he's still quite green at night, but tonight he jumped better than I could have hoped. I thought the course builder did a great job—you saw the perfect amount in the jump-off. I'm very happy with second place."

This season, Von Eckermann is focused on building back some lost confidence with his famed mount King Edward. "He jumped fantastic," exclaimed Von Eckermann. "He jumped a very good indoor season but in the jump-offs that were full speed, I'm a guy who wants to win and pushed a little too much and we lost a little confidence. He feels good and is jumping better and better with every show. These Saturday nights are fantastic and I'm looking forward to the [Rolex Finale] WEF 12."

Von Eckermann himself suffered a hand injury from a fall earlier in the WEF season and wore a brace on Saturday night as he continues to recover, concluding, "It's always the same; in the ring adrenaline is going and you want to do it and then afterwards you feel it, but it could have been worse and I'm happy that I'm able to continue riding. Emilie did a fantastic job tonight and I'm very happy for her."

Only three weeks after their memorable win in the \$150,000 WCHR Peter Wetherill Palm Beach Hunter Spectacular under the lights on the International Arena, Liza Towell Boyd and Ondine d'Orleans were back in action, this time on the grass derby in the \$25,000 USHJA International Hunter Derby, presented by Bainbridge Companies.

Among a very competitive field of international derby contenders, Boyd had two rides in the hunt-and-go format, taking on a course designed by Ken Smith. Still building up the partnership with Ondine d'Orleans, owned by Finally Farm and Neill Sites, Boyd ultimately closed the day on a one-two finish.

"This is her first time on this grass field," Boyd, who resides in Camden, SC, said of Ondine. "I wasn't too worried. She flatted great this morning. The footing is amazing for this late in the circuit."

Taking to the ring earlier in the order with MTM Crossed

My Mind, owned by Addy Grace Anderson, Boyd grabbed the high scores to that point of 88.5 and 97 for the classic and handy portions, respectively. Returning with Ondine, she didn't take every risk there was, but it turned out to be their lucky day.

"I did opt to do one small option with her," Boyd said of her chosen track. "The swoop jump was a tricky obstacle; it's tall and the ride to it was a little funny. I thought, 'I am winning on the other horse, so if I'm second or third with her I'm okay with that.' She's had a great season, and even

jumping the small option she jumped so well that we gained points elsewhere."

The scores to follow were a pair of 95s, for a two-round total of 190. In second at the close of the class was MTM Crossed My Mind with a score of 185.5. Emily Williams and Autumn Janesky's Damas de Tennerre, who won the first International Derby of the WEF season in January, finished third.

"We're still working," said Boyd. "Andrew Lustig helps me with the flat on her. Even if we win, we still have things we can do better. I think that's the beauty of this sport; we're

always learning. After the night class, we did a lot of working hunter trot transitions, counter canter, haunches in, haunches fore. We're always striving to work on her flatwork."

Now 11 years old, Ondine is starting to become the superstar Boyd knew she'd be. Still ahead of them is the \$50,000 USHJA International Hunter Derby on the grass during WEF 11.

"We've been lucky down here at Wellington as hunter riders this season," concluded Boyd. "They've highlighted hunters and given us a lot of opportunities. I'm really grateful to the horse show for that."

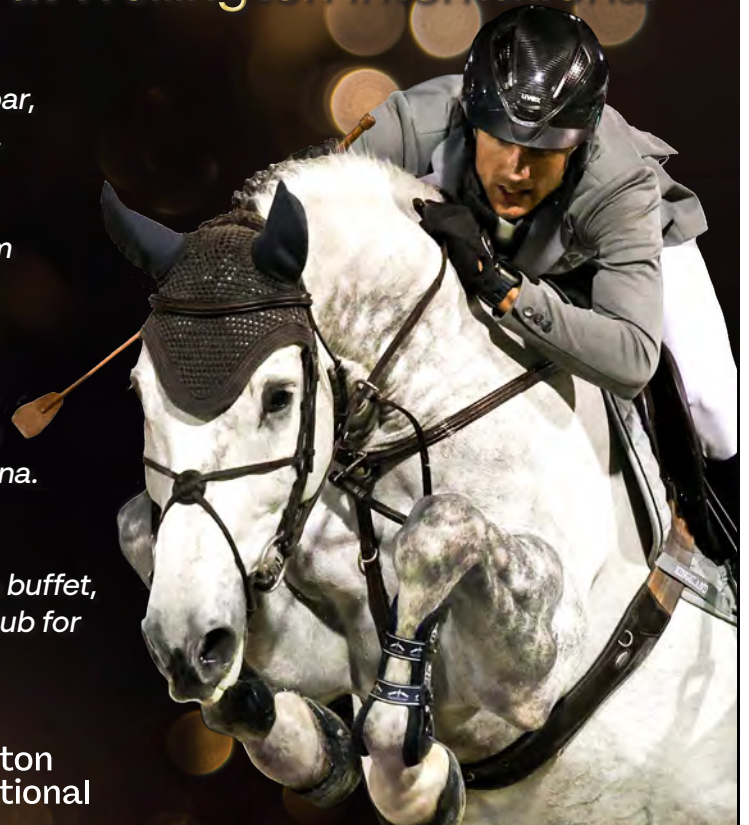
